Strategies & Tactics

AD TYPES

Biographical: Typically a positive ad describing a candidate. Intended to give uninformed voters an idea of the history of a

candidate.

Endorsement: Testimonial given from a celebrity or other well-known person.

Issue-Oriented: Describes a candidate's stance and past performance on a given issue.

Record: Often incorporated into a biographical or issue spot in which a candidate's previous action on an issue is

described.

Attack: Make assertions about the opponent in a variety of unflattering ways. Name-calling and/or groundless assertions

about one candidate by his/her opponent. This advertising strategy is used by a candidate primarily to create a

negative impression of one's opponent.

Response: An ad in which a candidate will react to negative attacks on his/her character.

Contrast: Juxtaposing positive images of one's candidacy with negative images of the opponent in the same ad.

Transfer: Use of popular symbols to create a positive connotation for the candidate or the use of negative or controversial

symbols to create a negative connotation of one's opponent.

TACTICS

Repetition: Intended to keep a word or phrase in the mind of the viewers. The more times viewers hear a name, word, or

phrase, the more likely they are to remember it.

Syntax: Some ads, particularly older ones, favor complex, lengthy, complete sentences. This method requires more

thought and attention on the part of the viewer, but often presents a more complete picture of the candidate. Others utilize fragments or phrases, which are easily accessible to the viewer, but may not fully explain the

candidate's position.

Language: Words that are loaded with positive or negative emotion.

Characters: People seen in the commercials—"real people", blue collar workers, children, policemen, soldiers, mothers,

elderly, teachers, terrorists, students, Osama Bin Laden, etc.

Music: Patriotic, somber, ominous, upbeat

Narrator: male, female, stern, happy, uplifting

Imagery: flags, 9/11, schools, prisons

Emotions: Fear, happiness, honor, pride

Candidate: Present?

Family: Wife, children

Animals: Farm, pets
